

Capital Credit retirement update

In the November PRECorp News, PRECorp announced a capital credit retirement or "refund" of about \$3.3 million. Since then, PRECorp's wholesale power supplier Basin Electric announced it has retired \$9.1 million, which will be returned to those who were Basin's cooperative members in 2008 and 2009.

PRECorp members will receive a total of \$12.1 million through this 2025 retirement of capital credits. This retirement returns a portion of the money members paid for electric usage during select years. Some Powder River Energy members will receive a credit on their bill or a check in the mail.

This year's PRECorp capital credit retirement is related to margins allocated to members during 2002 - 2003. Any member who had service with PRECorp in 2002 - 2003 will receive a percentage of the PRECorp capital credit retirement of \$3.3 million. Since its inception, PRECorp has retired well over \$150 million to its members.

Capital Credit retirement amounts of less than \$50 will be applied directly as a credit to the member's monthly bill.

Retirement amounts of \$50 or more were mailed December 12 to the members through a check. Inactive members with less than \$20 total unretired capital credits will receive their entire capital credit allocation amount – regardless of year earned - as part of this retirement.

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Powder River Energy has retired more than \$152 million to members – nearly \$12.1 million in 2025 alone. PRECorp hit by regional power blackout

On Thursday, November 13, PRECorp experienced a power blackout and voltage instability beginning approximately 12:45 p.m.

The resulting outage cut power to every PRECorp service, more than 27,000 meters in Campbell, Crook, Johnson, Sheridan and Weston counties in Wyoming and parts of southern Montana.

PRECorp engineers and operations personnel have learned the blackout resulted from power tripping, from an undetermined cause, at a 500-volt transmission line near Medicine Bow.

Cascading events rolled toward the PRE-Corp system and also affected electric providers at Montana-Dakota Utilities, Rocky Mountain Power, Black Hills Energy, Basin Electric, and Gillette City services. At its peak, more than 155,000 services from Casper to Rapid City to Sheridan and the northern edge of Cheyenne were out.

In all, approximately 30,000 square miles of the area covering western South Dakota to the Big Horn Mountains were in the dark for 3 to 8 hours.

In response, PRECorp deployed line crews to nearly all of its 30-plus substations to prepare to safely restore power to circuits across the system. "We wanted to have eyes on every substation before it was energized," VP of Engineering Quentin Rog-

ers said. "We avoided some problems for sure."

The restoration process began approximately 3 p.m. as incoming voltage stabilized and PRECorp crews prepared equipment settings to be re-energized. Crews successfully restored power to communities through individual substations beginning approximately 4:30 p.m. and final services were restored approximately 9 p.m.

PRECorp line crews, distribution design technicians, engineers, and information technology teams will conduct routine evaluations of equipment in the coming months to identify any damage that might have occurred during this incident.

PRECorp officials said the response was aided by favorable weather conditions that allowed linemen and others to access all facilities. Although the sudden loss of electricity across an entire region came as a jolt to residents and businesses who operate here, the PRECorp systems that protect infrastructure and consumers performed as designed as it responded to the high and low voltage scenarios. The PRECorp team operated nearly every switch and breaker in one afternoon and evening with only a few problems detected.

PRECorp is assisting with the investigation into the impact of this widespread and unprecedented incident.

Members who do not have a valid address on file with PRECorp will still receive their retirement, but it will be posted as "unclaimed" on their account. A member may claim capital credit "refunds" by providing proof of legal interest.

Unless they are claimed within three years, the unclaimed funds will be returned to the cooperative for the general benefit of the membership in the form of education scholarships, community grants, and other member-related benefits.

Since 2011, PRECorp has provided the opportunity for

members to help non-profit organizations in northeast Wyoming. To date, several members have generously donated their capital credits to the Powder River Energy Foundation, which has supported local charities in PRE-Corp's service territory with more than \$2.7 million in direct donations since its founding in 2007. A donation form was enclosed with each mailed capital credit check. Members who wish to donate their retirement, please complete the form and return it, with your check, to PRECorp.
